Wag-0-Shag Lodge Turns 70

70 years ago, a group of dedicated Scouting leaders sent in the application to form a new Order of the Arrow lodge for the Potawatomi Council. The Order of the Arrow, being relatively new at the time, was still expanding as more and more lodges were being established

across the country. 70 years later, the spirit of brotherhood and cheerful service is still strong. Generations of Arrowmen have passed through the ranks of Wag-O-Shag lodge and have led successful lives in and out of Scouting. As we approach the upcoming centennial of

the OA, this is a perfect time to reflect on our lodge's past and examine ourselves as we enter into a new Century of Service with the Order.

A Brief History Of The Lodge

In late 1943 and early 1944 Charles W. Woodson, Potawatomi Area Council Executive, conferred frequently with William G Hoffman, then Samoset Council Executive and Adviser to Area P of the Order of the Arrow, about starting a lodge in our council. Application for a lodge charter was submitted and approved by the National Council on October 21, 1944, with the number 280 being designated for the Potawatomi Area Lodge.

Dr. Vince Batha suggested the name "Wag-O-Shag" which was derived from the word "Waugooshance". Waugooshance, in the tongue of the Potawatomi Indians meant "little foxes". At that time, early 1800' s,

many foxes inhabited the area and it was also the totem of the local Indian tribe. Waugooshance was also a favorite name with the Indians for crooked rivers, whose winding resembled the eccentric trail of the cunning animals whose name they bore.

Original charter members were: Charles W Woodson, Dr. James Christiansen, Dr. Vince Batha, Robert Jansky, Barton Rodgers, James Huber, Rudolph Timmel, Fritz Grover, Eugene Radke, and Ronald Johnson.

The first lodge officers were: Charles W Woodson, Adviser, who appointed the following: Ronald Johnson, Lodge

Chief; James Huber, Scribe; Fred Grover, Treasurer.

Over the years the lodge has always been the leader at Area and Sectional Meetings as well as the National Order of the Arrow Conferences.



From The Communications Chairman

Greetings, Fellow Arrowmen,

Seventy years is quite a long time ago in the past to think about. In that year, America was fighting along-side her allies in World War II. Massive campaigns in the Pacific brought the fight closer to the Japanese home islands, while the liberation of Europe was started with Operation Overlord, the invasion of Normandy in France. Many Scouting activities across the country slowed down quite a bit as the nation's resources were needed for the war effort. But that didn't mean that young men and their leaders would abandon Scouting completely. Across America, Scout troops showed their dedication to their country by participating in war bond drives, rallies to collect scrap metal, and encouraged their fellow civilians to be resourceful by planting their own fruits and vegetables. It almost seemed like the home front was turned into one gigantic service project!

After the war, America paid back the Boy Scouts in numerous ways. Scout Troops received surplus Army tents and cooking gear, much to the delight of supply-weary Quartermasters everywhere. With the nation at peace, families were able to have their children involved in Scouting in record numbers. In 1947, the Potawatomi Council teamed up with returning soldiers and invited many of them to that year's summer camp at Long Lake. By that time, Wag-O-Shag was still a brand-new OA lodge, and they must have appreciated the help!

Boy Scouts and Arrowmen of 1944 would probably be both shocked and amazed on how troops and lodges would be run in the future. Imagine how an LEC member of the past would react to seeing lodge members communicate with each other with electronic mail and text messages that could travel infinitely faster than telegrams! Back then, a lodge newsletter would have taken weeks, if not months to set the type for the lettering and gathering important updates from the council. Now, The Fox can be published and sent out to every lodge member in the blink of an eye—an incredible feat, considering what few computers existed in 1944 took up an entire gymnasium's worth of space! [Editor's Note: Can't you tell I'm a history major?]

As we look back on 70 fruitful years of Wag-O-Shag's existence, we must remind ourselves that hard work and cheerful service can't always be brought on with new technology. Scouts and Arrowmen alike must be willing to use the tools and resources available at their disposal, even if it means building a camp chair with wood, a hammer, and nails or using lashings to create a campfire stove. But above all, Scouting and the Order of the Arrow is "a thing of the spirit," just as E. Urner Goodman said nearly 100 years ago. You must always have it in your thoughts to Do A Good Turn Daily, Be Prepared, and follow the OA Obligation. In this way, an Arrowman can accomplish anything he sets his mind to.
